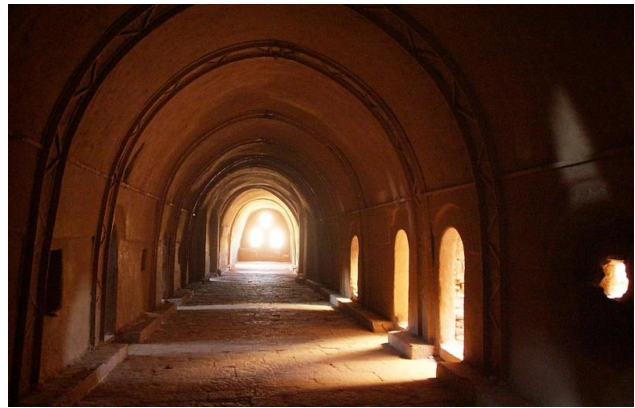


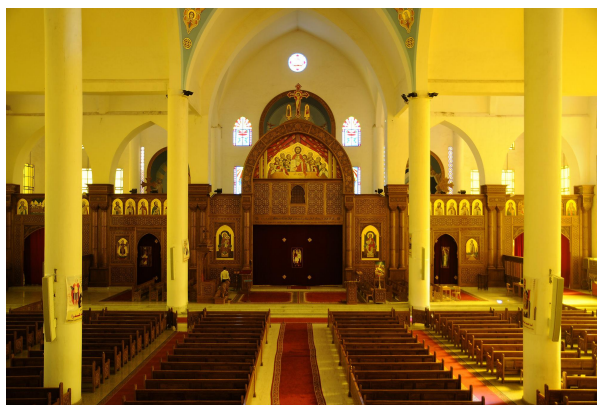

(2) Archangel Michael Cathedral for the Coptic Orthodox

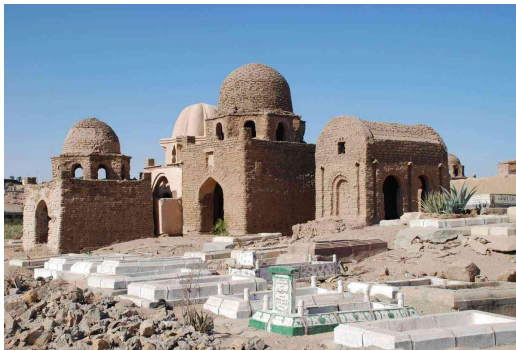
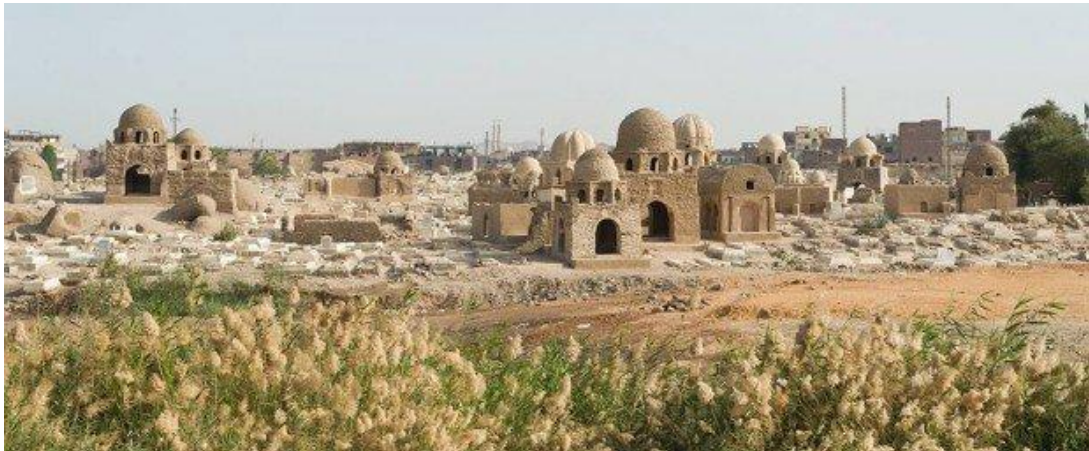
